

Vietnam: February 2-4, 1970

After nearly twenty hours on the plane, with short stops in Alaska and Japan, I landed at Bien Hoa Air Base two days after my 20th birthday on January 22nd. While on the plane, even though it was late at night, it was easy to see where the water stopped and we were now over Vietnam. Looking out the window, I had seen flares that had been launched upward from some firebases to try to expose the enemy to see if any were approaching to attack. That made it clear that my hopes of surviving a one year tour were just that, some very thin hopes because this was the real thing.

When I stepped off the airplane, the heat, humidity and smell made it clear I was far from the cold white snow covered ground of Michigan. I was at the 90th Replacement Battalion for a few days waiting for orders to be assigned to a unit. With an infantry MOS, I knew what I would be doing.

A Vietnamese man had a crude stand where he sold flavored drinks with a large

chunk of ice floating in the cup. A good cold drink was just what I needed. It was hard to believe but as I watched, the ice rapidly melted before it could cool the drink.

There was a poster on a wall showing all the unit patches and a description of the unit. The 1st Cavalry Division patch immediately

caught my eye and I thought it looked better than most of the others. It was quite a surprise when my orders were to join the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile).

From there I was sent to the 1st Cavalry rear area in Bien Hoa for a week of Cherry School which also gives the new guys (known as "cherries" (me) by anyone who had been in country for a while) time to get used to the very hot climate and more training. The sun was so intense that I had sunburn blisters on the back of my neck and where my sleeves had been rolled up on my upper arms.



Terry Garlock will be the featured speaker

at our Reunion in Myrtle Beach in May. In the Vietnam War, Terry was a Cobra helicopter gunship pilot. On December 17, 1969, he and Ron Hefner were shot down in a firefight. Ron was severely injured, Terry was disabled, trapped in the wreckage with a broken back, paralyzed legs and the enemy nearby. Two fellow pilots, John Synowsky and Graham Stevens, risked their neck by landing to help Ron and Terry, and received the Soldier's Medal for saving lives that day. Among the awards Terry received in Vietnam were the Purple Heart, Bronze Star and Distinguished Flying Cross. In 1971 Terry left the Army and put Vietnam behind him. When he had children late in life and considered the twisted version of that war they would read in their schoolbooks, he decided it was time he did his part to make sure the truth is told. This book "Strength & Honor, America's Best in Vietnam" is the result of his efforts.

In 1998 when the internet really came alive, I went out and got a PC. Well after some time I found the web site for Angry Skipper.

As I looked at it I begun to see some names I remembered from Vietnam. I called James Dotson (Top Gun) and we talked for some time. It was late September so we decided to meet in Tennessee. On Columbus Day, which was a three day weekend for most of us. As it got closer to the time to meet up, Top Gun called me and suggested to meet at another D 2/8 Vets house and we would go camping rather



than staying in a motel. It was ok with me because
I had a truck with a cover

on the back. I asked if I needed to bring anything. No, everything is taken care of was the reply.

So the day came and I left out early on a Saturday morning. I arrived first at Billy Lewis's house. Billy was in Wild Cat also. At mid-afternoon in comes the wild bunch.

So Tommy Harris (Smiley), Billy Lewis, James Dotson (Topgun), Larry Hempfling (The Saint), Jonny Mays (Duck Butter) roll in. I had not seen any of the four since I left Vietnam, But the four of them had. So it was a great moment for us to stare at each other, hug, and look back at how young we were then. Well as the day went on we started to get hungry. Where is the food?

What food? We were out in the middle of nowhere without food. Billy's wife made some sandwiches for us so we got by the first night. Come

to find out we had no food at all. It was rough, just like being back in the jungle. HA! We had a great weekend and we agreed to come back next year. I said to them I will come but we will not go without food or COFFEE again! Well Billy sold his farm so we moved it to Kentucky the next year. That year I brought the food and stoves to cook with. That year we had six show up. Well it got bigger and bigger as the years went by, the kitchen also got bigger. Now we have an average 40 show up each year. A long way from four. That is a lot of brothers.

So now we are at Fish Tail Lodge in Kentucky. They have cabins and motel rooms for rent. Out in front of the motel is a 40'x40' Pavilion where we set up the kitchen and mess hall.

We do all our cooking and eat real well. Out in front of the Pavilion we have a large place to have the campfire. So after a good meal you go sit by the fire and see who can tell the biggest tale. We eat each morning around 9:30. We have hot dogs and sandwiches for lunch. Make your own. Dinner is around 6:00pm. The best time is around the fire at night when the war is fought all over again. After all these years you still find out things you did not know back then. A lot of funny things happened then.

During the day some of the guys go to play golf, some ride the countryside stopping at flea markets looking for the old stuff.

You do what you want to, go to bed and get up when you want to. Eat or not eat. It is just laid back and enjoy yourself.

Garry Bruckner continued from page 1 I had just been assigned to D 2/8 with four other cherries. Next we were sent to what appeared to be D 2/8 headquarters and there was a big strange looking mountain rising up out of a flat plain. I was given an M16 that badly needed to be cleaned and was covered with a reddish dust. There seemed to me like a lot of scrounging around trying to find ruck sacks, canteens and other things we needed before being sent to the field. We were flown to Song Be only to get there to find out D 2/8 had just moved to Tay Ninh.

So we had to spent the night at Song Be and word was going around there was going to be a strip show. Evidently fate had dropped me in a very strange place. I didn't feel like going but everyone else wanted to go so it sure seemed better than being alone. We entered a building, formed a big circle and a Vietnamese guy, ARVN I would guess, since he was in uniform, come around collecting money. A thin small dark haired girl walked in to the center of our group and started dancing. I was saying something to my new friend beside me when he tapped my shoulder and pointed. The girl was right in front of me, turned around and wanted me to unfasten her bra. What the heck was I to do but honor her request. The bra was held together in back by a safety pin so it was easier to open than the hook and loop type arrangement we all had fun trying to undo with girls back home.

In the morning we were flown to FB Carolyn, and stayed overnight in a bunker. The artillery would get calls for fire missions during the night making it impossible to sleep with all the noise. On top of that, something kept running across my legs during the night which I know must have been rats.

We were told Delta company is operating with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment near Firebase Carolyn which is close to the Cambodian border. Even a new guy could tell that was not a good place to be. The NVA would come over the border and fight and then go back into Cambodia to resupply and take care of their wounded, where they knew we couldn't follow.

At Firebase Carolyn we then got on the log bird (supply helicopter) to join our company in the field. They were working with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment. There was some heated debate about what platoons most needed replacements. Two of us went to Range 2 platoon, one went to Cat platoon and the other two went to Range 1 platoon. The M-16 I was given was very dirty and needed to be cleaned, but there was no time as I needed to get my pack ready with a bedroll, which is a poncho

and poncho liner, 3 days supply of food, C-rations, and water. Also got a claymore mine, trip flare, smoke grenades, hand grenades, M-16 ammo and machine gun ammo to carry as I was going to be an ammo bearer with the gun team. I was given an empty M-60 machine gun ammo can in which to put my personal items, such as writing paper and letters from home. The ammo can is waterproof and fits inside my rucksack. The pack is so heavy that I can't swing it up on my back. I have to sit down with my back to it and put my arms in the straps and roll over and then stand up. We ride on top of the tracks (armored personnel carriers and tanks) which is much better than carrying my heavy pack and walking through thick, tangled jungle. The metal of the tracks is very hot from the sun and feels like sitting on a frying pan.

It was time to set up our night defensive position so the tracks formed a circle out in an open field, all facing outward. We dug foxholes for fighting positions between the tracks. In front of the tracks they placed two metal poles that hold heavy woven wire fence to stop RPG's (Rocket Propelled Grenades) that the NVA (North Vietnamese Army soldiers) fire at the armored personnel carriers and tanks to blow them up. I finally found some one with a bore brush and rod to clean my M-16. As I'm cleaning my weapon there was a "dupe, dupe, dupe" sound and someone yelled, "Incoming!" Everyone was scrambling for a foxhole or any cover, some were crawling under the APCs, while I was trying to get my M-16 put back together and then run for a foxhole. The foxholes were already filled with people so I just dropped flat on the ground. Eight mortars rounds were fired by NVA soldiers but none of them came very close. The tracks opened up with their .50 caliber machine guns and M-60 machine guns. If we had stayed in the same place the enemy would have been able to adjust their mortar fire, so we packed up everything and moved, leaving a platoon in the woodline for an ambush. They had starlight scopes and around 2000 (8:00 p.m.) they saw four NVA soldiers moving around in the open field from which we had just moved. One platoon of tanks and another of our platoon saddled up and rapidly headed back to the abandoned APC and started shooting when they saw the NVA. It was starting to get dark and you could see tracer rounds flying everywhere arching high into the sky. One NVA soldier had been killed during the firefight and two AK 47 assault rifles were captured. None of our guys had been wounded.

First day in the field, Welcome to Vietnam.
